SWM Community Improvement Plan (CIP) Submit Your Application February 1-21, 2022

Get Ready!

Now is the time to start getting your CIP application ready for submission.

2022 CIP applications will be received February 1 to 21, 2022.

Who is Eligible to Participate?

Owners of multi-unit residential properties, mixed-use buildings, commercial businesses. and industrial businesses within the urban boundary of Glencoe or Wardsville, as well as hamlet commercial uses within the Hamlet Areas or agricultural-business owners within municipality may be eligible to apply.

Additional applications or permits may be required prior to the submission of a CIP Application Please contact the Municipality for more information.

2021 YEAR IN REVIEW WARDEN'S REPORT

Over 1400 Vaccinations Administered in 2021

The Middlesex-London Paramedic Service (MLPS) COVID-19 Response Team launched its COVID-19 vaccine initiative early in 2021 and continues to offer vaccinations to residents in Middlesex County and London. What began as a mission to bring vaccines to homebound clients in Middlesex-London, soon developed into a comprehensive mobile vaccination program that brought thousands of vaccines to high-risk workplaces and small communities across the County.

Over the course of 2021, MLPS held twelve drive thru and pop-up vaccination clinics and administered over 1400 vaccines to employees and residents in Middlesex-London. To learn more about vaccination locations and updates, follow MLPS on social media at @MLPS911



Warden's Charity Golf Tournament Raises \$24,000

Thanks to the generous support of the local business community, the 2021 Middlesex County Warden's Charity Golf Tournament succeeded in supporting important community services in Middlesex County. Held on September 16, 2021, at The Fox Golf Club in Granton, the event raised \$20,000 for the Lucan Legion and \$4,000 for Victim Services Middlesex-London (VSML).



The funds will be used by the Lucan Legion to complete local capital improvements and support veterans in our community. VSML will apply the funds to support victims of crime and traumatic circumstances in Middlesex-London.

Middlesex County sees \$13 Million in Rural Broadband Investment

As a municipal partner of the Southwestern Integrated Fibre Technology (SWIFT) project, Middlesex County has been a strong advocate for the expansion of broadband in the County. Focused on bridging the digital divide in Southwestern Ontario, SWIFT subsidizes the construction of open-access, high-speed networks in underserved rural areas.

There are seven SWIFT related projects underway in Middlesex County. These projects cover a total of 221 km and are valued at more than \$13 million.

County Receives over \$1.4 Million to Support Residents in Need

In 2021, over \$1.4 million in new funding supported Middlesex County residents with housing, transportation, and other core needs.

The funds, received through the Government of Ontario's Social Service Relief Fund, support programs including: the Middlesex County Housing Benefit, a benefit that offers partial support to low-income residents looking for market rentals; the Middlesex County Shuttle Service, a service that provides low-income and vulnerable residents in the County with free transportation to vaccination and medical appointments; and the Whatever It Takes Fund, a fund to provide emergency accommodation, emergency food, personal hygiene items and other necessities to vulnerable persons.

Expanded Active Transportation Networks Underway

In 2021, the Middlesex County Cycling Strategy moved from planning to implementation. Over 24 km of new paved shoulders were completed and many more repaved. Middlesex County is committed to continuing the expansion of safe, active transportation as part of capital construction in the County.

Library's Community Navigator Connects Families

In 2021, Middlesex County Library's Community Navigator program supported residents facing homelessness, housing insecurity and other related challenges. In the first year of operation, the Community Navigator helped 478 families access services and supports related to housing, employment, education, mental health and addiction, food and clothing, and social assistance.

Women's Caucus Established to Address Pandemic Challenges

The first-ever Middlesex County Women's Caucus was established in October 2020 in response to the disproportionate impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on women. Throughout 2021, the Caucus met virtually with dozens of women from communities across the County to better understand the challenges women are facing because of the pandemic. The Women's Caucus continues to host focus groups in early 2022 to determine how Middlesex County can best support women in a post-pandemic world. 

2022 Budget

Council approved the 2022 operating budget at a 2.53% increase over the previous year. This translates to an increase of \$8.41/month for an average home valued at \$186,224. Council was first presented with a budget that was a 6.58% increase over 2021 but with a lot of hard decisions they were able to reduce expenses in the budget by \$279,319 resulting in responsible increase for 2022 while exceeding existing service levels.



We are excited about the capital projects planned for 2022, including playground equipment, new sidewalks, and the Glencoe Memorial Arena renovation project which is also supported through Federal an Provincial funding, just to name a few.
